## BLACKSTOCK TRADERS UNDER SIEGE

Ken Bayliss, of Prime Meats in the Blackstock Road, demanded an interview with the Chief Inspector of Police after the riots on 16th May, FA Cup Final Day. *'I asked him what shopkeepers were meant to do - close up? People were jumping on moving cars, smashing shop windows and trashing cars and shop interiors. It was all fuelled by the alcohol - the beer bottles were convenient missiles and there was glass all over the place.'* The restaurant, Small & Beautiful, lost thousands of pounds in turnover because of the rioting. *'No-one came on Saturday, obviously, but our customers didn't come back for several days afterwards either. I spent 7 hours standing outside the shop keeping people from smashing the shop-front window'* said one of the managers there.

Another shop-keeper, Leonard Senior, who runs a Car Audio Shop, agrees with Ken Bayliss's view that the police seemed to be

watching the riots rather than stopping them. However, 38 people were arrested in Highbury and the police had been criticised for being heavy-handed during the riots a few weeks earlier, when Arsenal won the Championship. Being so heavily residential and with narrow streets this is a very hard area to police. According to police there were 12,000 people in the Blackstock Road during the League Championship game - making a total of 50,000 people in and around the Stadium.

In contrast to the riots of FA Cup Final Day, the Parade the following day was a great festive occasion, with red and white flags everywhere and people coming from all over London to watch Arsenal's Double winning team in the open-topped bus parade to the Town Hall in Upper Street. ♦

## **Cllr Mary Creagh - HIGHBURY WARD**

We're barely a month into the new Council and I'm still finding my way round the corridors down at the Town Hall! The election campaign and results were a very sobering experience for both old and new (in all senses of the word) Labour councillors and have given rise to a new sense of urgency around reforms to services.

Highbury people that I spoke to on the doorstep had 3 clear complaints:-

- \* the low levels of educational attainment in our secondary schools;
- \* low levels of cleanliness on our streets;
- \* poor service from the Council on all matters relating to housing.

These concerns are the clear priority action areas for us over the coming 4 years. I believe that I and my colleagues were elected not only to represent Highbury, although this is our primary duty, but also to turn around the council's delivery in these areas at a more corporate, strategic level. The new area of "best value" provides us with a radical new mechanism of making our services

come up to scratch. It involves every council service being systematically reviewed in partnership with local communities who pay for and use the services as to whether it should be provided, what it should look like and how and by whom it should be delivered. This will make the Council's services more transparent and accountable and let local people articulate their priority areas.

There is also grave concern about the level of violent crime on Highbury Fields and this is one area where a co-ordinated approach by police and the Council's youth and education services needs to be made. The new powers that the Labour government have introduced to deal with anti-social behaviour on estates will be key to helping us tackle this area.

Regeneration plans for the Finsbury Park area are being drawn up, in partnership with Haringey and Hackney, and I would welcome your views as to the priority areas there. There are continuing discussions as to the upgrading of the area round Highbury and

Islington tube station and station refurbishment. I and many others on the Nag's Head Neighbourhood Forum are concerned about the levels of illegal trading on Holloway Rd and Seven Sisters Rd on Saturdays in particular. I believe these tat merchants tarnish the image of the Nag's Head and take business away from legitimate shops and stalls who pay business rates. I am seeking meetings with the major retailers and Islington's Chamber of Commerce to look at this, and other areas of common concern.

I hope to meet as many people as possible over the coming 4 years and to share the good times as well as the difficult ones! You can contact me via the members room at Islington Town Hall, or visit our surgeries at the **Sobell Neighbourhood Office, Hornsey Rd on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of each month from 10.30am or at the Central Library, Fieldway Crescent on the 1st and 3rd Friday of the month from 3pm onwards**. ## **Cllr Laura Willoughby - QUADRANT WARD**

What will the Liberal Democrats do for Highbury? We are going to fight for what we promised.

We now send out this HCA News to over 500 members, nearly all are delivered by hand, by volunteer residents and shop-keepers. What was the initial impetus to form the HCA? The HCA formed when residents heard that the Council's Planners said Arsenal PLC must own 25+ houses behind the West Stand, if two new stands are built. Most people are aware that Arsenal has been looking for a new site. The current 10.54 acres at Highbury is not big enough for 50,000 seats, let alone the ancillary entertainment facilities, hotels and conference suites that all its major rivals now have on sites of 20 acres or more, if that's what Arsenal wants too. People living in the area fear that the Football Company will want to buy up more properties in a few years to keep up with Newcastle, Manchester United, Leeds and Chelsea, which are already planning 7 days a week non-football events.

The HCA says that Arsenal is welcome to stay and expand within the ground it already owns, provided homes are not blighted and the traffic problems are solved. That is our compromise, supported by local Councillors and our MP. At least Arsenal has shown it can win the Double without the need for more income or a bigger ground! It would be better still for Highbury, if Arsenal could stay the size it is now - and continue as the great Club it is already. According to Arsene Wenger, even 50,000 seats is not enough to satisfy the current demand for tickets. So, how could it be enough in five years' time?

Good has come out of bad - we now have a Community Association, with links to the long-established Highbury Fields Association and the Finsbury Park Action Group. We are formally constituted to act for a wide range of issues. The Association can only be as good and as effective as the members make it, as everyone gives their time voluntarily. Can you help with delivering leaflets occasionally, to streets in your area? Have you any ideas or suggestions? What about a Street Party?
